At the pilot Scout Camp held on Brownsea Island in August 1907, Robert Baden-Powell gave the boys a Scout symbol to wear on their coats or hats. This was the first ever Scout Badge. Since then, badges have been an essential part of the Scouting programme, regarding the badges that can be earned and those made to recognise events attended.

One of the traditions at the Jamboree is the trading of badges. Scouts eagerly engage in a bustling marketplace of colourful symbols representing the different Troops at the Jamboree. The badge trading fosters camaraderie among Scouts and serves as a tangible reminder of the diverse experiences and friendships formed during the Jamboree.

Each badge tells a unique story, and the exchange of these emblems crosses language barriers, forging lasting connections that embody the spirit of Scouting unity and global fellowship.

This year, Scouts will be able to swap for over 150+ Troop and Staff badges. There are many excellent badge designs, and trading is expected to be busy!

The New Zealand Badgers Club (NZBC) will be assisting the Jamboree GLOBCITPEA programme by providing a variety of things to do: a badge recognition activity, a display of badges, blankets, old uniforms and books, and an opportunity to trade badges. The Club is also open to trading whenever a Scout has free time. All Scouts participating in the activities can

earn themselves the Club Award badge.

The Club members attending the Jamboree are all willing to share their experiences about collecting. If you want to collect badges after the Jamboree, they can guide you in starting a badge collection and how it can be presented.

The Badgers Club has been running for over 50 years, initially as part of the International Badgers Club based in the UK and then from the 1990s as a New Zealand-based club. Today, the Club holds a membership of nearly 200 people from New Zealand and worldwide. Membership is only \$10 a year for an email membership or \$20 per year for a postal membership.

The Club allows collectors to enjoy collecting Scout and Guide badges. It holds meetings throughout the country and via online swap sessions through the Club's Facebook Group. The post-Jamboree online swap session will be held at the end of January. The Club also helps to play a role in maintaining the history of badges made in New Zealand by writing badge catalogues and supporting a gallery of badge scans on its website.
