23RD AOTEAROA NEW ZEALAND SCOUT JAMBOREE - MYSTERY CREEK

Jamboree is always jam-packed full of fun, friends and adventure and this Jamboree is shaping up to be one of the most awesome yet.

Our specialised Adventure Team lead by Guy Beatson have developed the ideas from the Jamboree Youth Leadership Team over the past 18-months to come up with this Jamboree's programme.

There are three full-day and four half-day bases for the Scouts to explore.

EACH ACTIVITY WILL GIVE SCOUTS
THE OPPORTUNITY TO PUSH THEIR LIMITS AND CHALLENGE THEM BOTH PHYSICALLY AND MENTALLY WHILE DEVELOPING BETTER COMMUNITIES.





Activities are based onsite around Mystery Creek and at two specialised adventure locations at Lake Karapiro and the Waipari Climbing Centre.

Scouts will be exploring these activities in their teams alongside other teams from different Troops allowing them many opportunities to meet Scouts from around Aotearoa New Zealand, Australia, Cook Islands, Tahiti, Fiji, New Caledonia, and Hong Kong, to name a few.



Each base has been designed to be adventurous and guide the Scouts and Leaders to know more about the Scout Award Scheme and how Scouts can achieve it by setting personal goals and accomplishing these.

The names of the bases

The names of the bases are taken from the Adventure Skills and Better World Projects in the Youth Programme.

The three "Adventures" are WATBOAPADFLY, VERTEMERGE and CAMTRAMBIK.

The "Worlds" are ENVO, GLOBCITPEA, COMTY and ADVENTUREEV.

The names can give a hint about what sort of activities will be discovered in each Adventure or World.

We do not wish to spoil the fun; it is more of a precautionary note about an unwelcome visitor to the WATBOAPADFLY water base.

The unwelcome visitor is the freshwater gold clam, also known as the Asian Gold Clam. A native to eastern Asia, it is widely established in North and South America and Europe.

These clams reproduce rapidly and form large populations that can clog water-based infrastructure, such as electricity generation plants, irrigation systems, and water treatment plants.

The clams are filter feeders that can potentially compete with native species for food. Ministry of Primary Industries does not know how this species will respond in New Zealand conditions. Overseas, it hasn't proved easy to control, and eradication has never been achieved.

This freshwater mollusc was discovered along a stretch of the Waikato River in May 2023. Biosecurity New Zealand is working with iwi and other partners to prevent the spread of the clam.

As a precautionary measure, we will run an awareness campaign to help prevent the spread of the clam and the treatment to be carried out in future e-zine editions. For further information, please click on the following link:

When Scouts Aotearoa deferred the national events by a year due to COVID-19, the four-year gap meant that some Scouts would potentially miss out on a Jamboree experience.

Laurence Fauatea, Jamboree Director, was determined to ensure that no one missed this once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

"By the same token, we recognised that it wasn't appropriate to hold Venturers back in the Scout section so they could come to this Jamboree."

The answer was Venturer Active, where Venturers under 16 years and four months can attend the Jamboree and still have a Scout experience.

Like Scouts, the Venturer Active participants will be organised into small teams of six and get to do the same Scout programme, supported by Leaders where needed.

The exception to the Scouting programme is that Venturer Actives will be catered for. Fauatea added, "They've all had plenty of experience with camp cooking, so why not give them a different aspect of Jamboree."

Instead, the Venturer Active participants will rotate through a service day as they won't need to be part of a 'duty patrol' for the day. However, chores and activities around the Jamboree site will be counted towards their service hours.

The Venturer Actives will have the added advantage of being part of a more considerable Troop based at their subcamp with fellow participants from around Aotearoa and overseas — a great chance to network and build bonds with the wider Scouting whānau (family).

The Venturer Active subcamp, one of five, at the Jamboree will be known as Nukuhau. Blue is the subcamp colour theme and will follow through in their official shirts and other apparel, along with their logo and badge.

The five Jamboree subcamps have been named after the streams flowing through the Waikato region. Nukuhau is the piece of land on the western side of Lake Taupo, to the south of Mystery Creek, where the mighty Waikato River leaves the lake.

Cory Lang, a past National Venturer Leader and Director of several New Zealand Ventures, will lead the subcamp of over 200 participants and around 30 Staff and Leaders.

Lang is enthusiastic to lead this part of the Jamboree and have the opportunity to make the best possible event for our young people.


